PUBLIC PORTION

Mr. Morrow made a motion, seconded by Mr. Smith to open the meeting to the public. All were in favor; the motion was approved.

Patricia Griffith, Brown Street – Ms. Griffith asked who made the decision to only pave the center of Leon after the sewer line was repaired.

Mr. Hutchins and Ms. Eggers explained that the trench has been filled and will be given time to settle. The roadway will be completely repaved in the future.

Ms. Griffith reported that there are still holes at the corner of Leon and Fifth.

Ms. Eggers stated that punch list items are being completed and she will relay Ms. Griffith's information to the township engineer.

Ms. Griffith asked when various financial information will be posted on the website.

Ms. Eggers reported that both the 2025 financial statement and the audit report should be on the township website.

Ms. Griffith asked why more money is needed for the tanks at the sewer plant.

Mr. Jeney explained that there were unexpected issues that, when encountered, required additional funds.

Ms. Griffith asked whether PSE&G should be paying for the sidewalk improvements mentioned in Resolution 2026-76 and 2026-77.

Ms. Eggers explained that the sidewalk mentioned in those resolutions runs between Ashley Crossing and Fairview Boulevard and is on a different section of Hartford Road than the area

Ms. Griffith is referring to.

William Spych, 518 Brown Street – Mr. Spych asked for the start and end dates for the 2026 roadway improvements project mentioned in Resolution 2026-06.

Ms. Eggers stated that the project has not even gone out for bid yet. The resolution is to cover the engineering costs for bid specs and design. The dates for the project are pending.

Mr. Spych asked about the sanitary sewer improvements on Norman Avenue noted in Resolution 2026-07.

Ms. Eggers explained that as soon as the engineer is finished with the design it will go out to bid.

Mr. Spych asked when the 2026 municipal budget will be placed on the Township website.

Ms. Eggers responded that it will be posted tomorrow.

Mr. Spych asked, in reference to Resolution 2026-73 and 2026-74, who is the point of contact for acceptance of any donations?

Ms. Eggers stated that the Township's Chief Financial Officer is responsible for handling the donations.

Mr. Spych asked, in reference to Resolution 2026-79, what is cited in change order #2 for the Leon Avenue sanitary sewer improvements project?

Ms. Eggers reported that it is showing a reduction in the final contract amount of the project which came in \$179,946.45 under budget.

Debbie Hammond, 230 Paddock Way – Ms. Hammond thanked everyone for the effort they put into the Vermes Field Lighting Project, stating that the field is bright while her backyard which is adjacent to the field, is completely dark.

Jen Reppert, Delran – Ms. Reppert reported that it is difficult to hear the meetings when watching on the Township YouTube channel.

Ms. Reppert asked if it would be possible for the Township CFO to give a presentation which would explain the 2026 budget.

Mr. Jeney responded that the Mayor usually presents the budget, but the CFO could be present.

Ms. Eggers advised that there is also a PowerPoint in conjunction with the public hearing.

Ms. Reppert asked if there is a limit as to how much people can donate to the police and K9 unit,

referenced in Resolutions 2026-73 and 2026-74.

Joe Schneider, 610 South Chester Avenue – Mr. Schneider stated that he is very concerned with the speeding that occurs on Chester Avenue and the surrounding areas. He stressed that someone is going to get hurt and suggested additional stop signs, speed bumps, etc.

Mr. Jeney advised that additional police officers have been hired and will be designated to traffic control. The issue has also been discussed with Senator Singleton.

Mr. Morrow stated that the Township will be speaking with the DOT regarding traffic on Route 130. He also stressed the importance of having consequences for disobeying traffic laws throughout the Township and discussed a few options.

Karen Nothacker, 11 Auburn Drive – Ms. Nothacker asked if the Youth Advisory Committee will be receiving training regarding how the government works.

Mr. Jeney explained that the committee provides an opportunity for teenagers to offer suggestions to the Township from their unique perspective.

Mr. Hutchins stated that it gives teenagers the opportunity to have a voice like everyone else in the Township.

Keith Graham, 305 Tenby Chase Drive – Mr. Graham asked how law enforcement will regulate the use of eBikes in the Township to avoid a tragedy in the future.

Mr. Jeney explained that the Township passed an ordinance to regulate the usage of the bikes and the state of NJ has done the same. He advised everyone noticing the improper usage of eBikes to call the police department.

Mr. Coluzzi advised that the state law will require eBikes to be registered, riders to wear helmets and the drivers will have to follow the rules of the road like any other motor vehicle.

Gary Catrambone, 261 Burning Tree Road – Mr. Catrambone stressed the importance of residents giving their names and addresses during the public comment portion of the Township meetings. He also advised everyone to direct their comments to the Council President who can then determine how to proceed.

Mr. Jeney explained that the Mayor and Council are working to upgrade the system so that will not be a problem in the future.

Mr. Smith made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Apeadu to close the meeting to the public. All were in favor; the motion was approved.

REPORTS

Emergency Services – No reports

Boards/Committees – Deb Hammond, Delran Green Team – Ms. Hammond thanked Council for the opportunity to honor the Tree of Honor recipients at the Township meeting. The trees will be planted this Thursday at Delran Community Park.

She announced that there will be a spruce up day at the “Alboretum” located at the Chester Avenue jughandle.

Ms. Hammond reported that on May 9th the Green Team will be partnering with VFW Post #3020 for a day of service at Lake Lonnie. Everyone is welcome and it would be an honor to see veterans in attendance.

There will be a rain barrel workshop at Lake Lonnie on May 16th. Rain barrels are a great way to conserve water and there will be information on how to wisely use water outdoors. There will also be a plant swap on the same day.

She reminded residents that all orders for trees from Fernbrook Farms are due by April 15th.

Ms. Eggers – Ms. Eggers advised that concrete work has begun on Princeton Drive, there is spot sewer replacement on Dartmouth and various storm sewer replacements are continuing. All work is part of the 2025 road program.

Stewart Avenue Phase II concrete work will begin at the end of April.

Summerhill Hockey and Baseball Field improvements, plans, specs, and estimates are being finalized by the engineer. It is anticipated that the project will be ready to bid by the end of this week.

Clean up days will begin Wednesday April 22 through Friday April 24th from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. and Saturday, April 25th from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. There will also be a shredding event on Thursday, April 23rd from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in the side parking lot of the Municipal Building.

Mr. Hutchins – Mr. Hutchins congratulated the Recreation Advisory Committee for the funds they have raised for township events.

He commented that research will be done to see what kind of traffic calming measures are feasible in busy areas of the Township as well as how to instruct riders on the safe operation of eBikes.

Mr. Hutchins encouraged everyone to attend future shows of 08075 Can Sing! Tickets are

available for \$35 and include a buffet dinner and amazing performances.

Mr. Coluzzi – No report

Ms. Cure – Ms. Cure expressed her appreciation to the Green Team and the Recreation Advisory Committee for their presentations this evening.

She advised that Public Works is a great resource for residents to learn how to dispose of and recycle a variety of items.

Mr. Morrow – Mr. Morrow reported that there was a recent meeting with Senator Troy Singleton where a variety of subjects were discussed including traffic flow on Route 130 where the Alina Apartments are being constructed, help for renters in the Township, and the development of the Clark's Landing Marina.

He suggested looking into some mobile traffic calming measures that are available.

Mr. Morrow noted that the road striping on Tenby Chase Drive near Route 130 has worn away and needs to be repainted.

He cautioned residents to follow the rules for branch pick-up so that it doesn't overtax the Public Works Department and things run smoothly throughout the town.

Mrs. Apeadu – Mrs. Apeadu asked when the state requires the budget to be adopted.

Ms. Eggers stated that it must be adopted by April 30th or the next Council meeting which for Delran Township is May 12th.

Mr. Smith – Mr. Smith thanked the Green Team for their amazing programs and also the RAC for their many events throughout the year as well as successful fundraising.

He announced that the next Town Hall will be on Tuesday, May 5th at 7:00 p.m. in the Municipal Building. The gathering will include Assemblywoman Carol Murphy and Assemblyman Balvir Singh. The evening will provide an opportunity for residents to gather more information regarding what their state representatives do in Trenton.

Mr. Jeney – Mr. Jeney assured residents that the issues surrounding eBikes and traffic in the Township will be discussed.

He announced that the Green Team will be giving a presentation at the next Public Meeting. Committees will give presentations every few months to keep everyone up to date with their accomplishments.

Mr. Jeney also urged residents to attend the 08075 Can Sing performances, stating that there were

incredibly talented people competing at the event.

No action was taken.
